Nearly six out of every ten they do not want the U.S. Navy to intervene if Japan decides to attack British Singapore and the Dutch

Although 10 per cent of the nation's students were undecided on this issue, the remainder are divided in this fashion:

U. S. should intervene, 41%.

U. S. should not intervene, 59%. Singapore, as one of the larges naval bases in the world, and the Dutch East Indies would be strategically advantageous to Japan's Far East sea operations.
